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Instructions for Skin Allergy Testing

Medications to Avoid:

- No prescription or over the counter oral antihistamines should be used 4 to 5 days PRIOR to the scheduled skin testing.
- These include cold tablets, sinus tablets, hay fever medications, or treatments for itchy skin, over the counter allergy medications such as: Claritin, Zyrtec, Allegra, Actifed, Dimetapp, Benadryl, and many others.
- Prescription antihistamines such as **Montelukast**, **Zafirlukast**, **Clarinex**, **and Xyzal**, should also be stopped at least **5 days prior to testing**. If you have any questions whether or not you are using an antihistamine, please ask the nurse or the provider.
- Over the counter sleeping medications (e.g. Tylenol PM) and prescription sleep aids such as Trazodone or Doxepin also contain active ingredients that interfere with histamine and these should <u>NOT</u> be taken within 3 days of your scheduled skin test.
- You should discontinue your nasal and eye antihistamine medications, such as Flonase, Rhinocort, Nasonex, Nasacort, Omnaris, Veramyst, Nasarel, Patanase, Patady, Astepro, Optivar, or Astelin at least 2 days before the testing.
- Hold all **Beta Blocker** medications (prescription meds ending in "olol", e.g. Metoprolol) at least **24 hours before skin test.**

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Medications to Continue:

- Asthma inhalers (**inhaled steroids and bronchodilators**) and oral theophylline such as **Theo-Dur**, **T-Phyl**, **Uniphyl**, **Theo-24**, do not interfere with skin testing and should be used as prescribed.
- Most drugs do not interfere with skin testing but make sure that the skin allergy tech and physician know about every drug that you are taking. (Please bring a list if necessary).
